


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CNR IRISS

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
CNR IRISS mission

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Collaboration network

Specifically, the topics of **Place-based strategies and policies for local development** are developed also within international research projects.

CLIC – Circular models Leveraging Investments in Cultural heritage adaptive reuse (ongoing) (Horizon 2020 SC5-22-2017 "Innovative financing, business and governance models for adaptive re-use of cultural heritage")

The project develops financing, business and governance models for the circular adaptive reuse of cultural heritage and historical urban landscapes to implement a full circular economy in cities and regions.

BESECURE – Best Practice Enhancers for Security in Urban Regions (FP7-SEC-2011-1 Collaborative project no. 285222, 2012-2015)

The project explored the security in urban areas, building a comprehensive set of indicators to form an early warning system for local policymakers that can help to recognize undesirable social developments in urban areas that impact the sense of security.

The project aimed at supporting public and private subjects involved in urban planning and building construction in earthquake risk areas.

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
ONGOING PROJECTS

THE IMPACTS OF SHARING PLATFORMS FOR TOURISM ON SPACES AND COMMUNITIES coordinated by Gabriella Esposito de Vita

GOAL

To investigate impacts of the **shadow hospitality** on urban area and to explore how place-based regeneration processes could contribute to **rebalance economic opportunities and risks** produced by **sharing platform in tourism**, by dealing with challenges such as **loss of authenticity** of places and **gentrification** trends.

Within the national and international scenario, the phenomenon of sharing economy in tourism is strictly linked to the "**shadow hospitality**" models and the increasing touristification. This new trend in tourism needs to be investigated in terms of impacts on local communities, public spaces and urban cultures as well as on the *genius loci*.







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ONGOING PROJECTS

INNOVATIVE STRATEGIES FOR REGENERATING SMALL VILLAGES AND INNER AREAS Coordinated by Stefania Oppido

GOAL

To explore how to implement approaches for reducing **territorial inequalities** by contrasting **marginalisation trends**. The research aims at investigating the role of **landscape** as a driver for improving social, cultural and economic innovation in inner areas through synergic processes between **top-down policies** and **bottom-up initiatives**. First ongoing case study has been selected in Italy within the framework of the **Italian National Strategy for Inner Areas** that promotes a **place-based approach** for regenerating these contexts. The Strategy is part of **Cohesion Policy**.


SOCIAL ECONOMICS AND HYBRID ORGANISATIONS FOR THE URBAN REGENERATION AND SOCIAL INNOVATION OF HISTORIC AREAS

Coordinated by Stefania Ragozino

GOAL

The specific objective of the project is to test the combination obtained by the interaction between **hybrid organizations**, **historical urban landscape** and **local communities** in a **multi-sectoral collaboration**.

In this context, the project explores the role of social enterprise and hybrid approaches aimed at complementarity, integration and cooperation between institutions, stakeholders and local communities with social objectives. These subjects integrate initiatives, funds and resources attributable to spheres that normally do not communicate effectively: public and private, formal and informal, profit and non-profit.







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Fields of cooperation within TREnD project

- place-based regeneration processes and civic economics drivers;
- participatory-collaborative processes and stakeholders and network analysis;
- balanced and equitable local development with a specific focus on marginalised cultures and areas

How?

- To promote a more effective **involvement of communities and territorial stakeholders** within the decision making process
- To share **methodologies for improving the mutual exchange** amid actors involved in the planning processes
- To address the **engagement of local communities** in order to feed collaborative pilot projects.

The CNR IRISS will **support the co-creation of the TREnD Open Access Toolkit** in terms of improving the enabling-and-sharing platform by capturing the network dynamics and territorial trend.

Finally, due to its strong relationships with local, national and European research institutions and local authorities, the CNR IRISS will be part of the **knowledge and technology transfer** by enhancing the effectiveness and increasing the impacts of the Open Access platform by developing pilot projects and collaborative initiatives.
